Don Riepe, has been the NY Chapter Director of the American Littoral Society for the past 25 years and has been designated as "Jamaica Bay Guardian" by NYSDEC. He recently retired from the National Park Service where he worked as a naturalist and manager of the Jamaica Bay Wildlife Refuge in NYC. Don has written many articles on natural history subjects and his photographs have been published in many journals including Scientific American, National Wildlife, Audubon, Defenders, Underwater Naturalist, Parade and The New York Times. He has an M.S. in Natural Resources Management from the University of New Hampshire and has taught a course in Wildlife Management at St. John's University. Currently, he serves as a board member for NYC Audubon.

Developing Sustainable Seafood Production in Haiti

Haitians are starving! They have the lowest per capita calorie intake in the world. Yearly seafood consumption is nearly 14 kg below the world average (18 kg/yr.) and only 22% of the seafood consumed in Haiti is produced there. Dr. John Foster will explore how the development of Haiti's extensive marine and freshwater resources could be utilized to improve their economy and alleviate poverty. Dr. Foster works with the SUNY Research Foundation and SUNY Global through a grant from the Kellogg Foundation. He retired from SUNY Cobleskill after 30 years, serving as Professor of Fisheries & Aquaculture and Department Chair of the Fisheries, Wildlife & Environmental Science Department for 13 years. Among other honors, Dr. Foster received the Chancellor's Award for Teaching Excellence and the SUNY Research Foundation Award for Excellence in Research.
