Notes for SUNY Cobleskill-The College of Saint Rose Childhood Education Agreement:

- Students should be sure to take a science course with a laboratory component, as a lab science is required to fulfill L09: Scientific Knowledge & Inquiry.
- ECHD 170 Child Growth and Development transfers into Saint Rose as EPY 244 Life-Span Human Development, a Major Requirement for the Childhood Education program. This course also fulfills the Liberal Education Requirement L11: Behavioral and Social Sciences II.
- Students will transfer in with a total of 15 General Elective credits. The deficit credit will be yielded by ECHD 280.
- The combination of ECHD 232 Practicum and ECHD 234 Practicum: School and Community Agencies, will earn a student 5 credits of student teaching required at Saint Rose. The additional 3 credits from these courses will be used toward Education and/or General Electives. In order to receive the 5 credits of student teaching, students must have a minimum of 175 hours in a kindergarten, first, second, or third grade classroom. Beyond the 175 hours minimum, ECHD 232 and ECHD 234 also contain 25 pre-student teaching field hours. Upon the completion of their A.A.S. in Early Childhood degree, students will have exceeded the minimum 175 hours required for the five credits of student teaching. In addition, students are required to have spent a minimum of one solo-week (five full days) of teaching in the classroom.
- Credits for ECHD 240 Aspects of Family Health are applied as General Elective credit. ECHD 280 Children with Special Needs transfers in as SED 146 Individuals w/Disabilities & Exceptionalities School/Community. ECHD 240 will fulfill EPY 337 Substance Abuse Education and EDU 106 HIV/AIDS, Communicable Disease & Safety ED requirements, although no credit will be awarded for these. The waiving of the Child Abuse Education Requirement is contingent upon SUNY Cobleskill issuing a State Education Department approved "Certificate of Completion" for "Coursework/Training in Identification and Reporting of Child Abuse and Maltreatment" to the student upon completion of ECHD 280.
- Where applicable, students should take courses that fulfill both Liberal Education requirements and Academic Concentration requirements.
- The maximum number of transfer credits allowed is 62.
